Abstract

Metro Big Rivers Phase 4 partnership will protect in fee 300 acres, protect in easement 150 acres, restore 32 acres and enhance 99 acres of priority wildlife habitat within the big rivers corridors in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Urbanizing Area.

Activity Detail

Design and Scope of Work

The five partners of the Metro Big Rivers are experienced conservation organizations working together and with numerous public partners to protect, restore and enhance priority habitat for wildlife and the public in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Urbanizing Area. Emphasis is on creating and connecting wildlife habitat corridors to expand and improve opportunities both for wildlife and wildlife-dependent recreation in the greater Twin Cities metropolitan area. Partners and their projects for this Phase 4 grant are described below.

Friends of the Mississippi River (FMR) – Enhance habitat at two publicly-owned sites that provide critical wildlife habitat and public recreation opportunities in the Mississippi River watershed in Dakota and Washington Counties. The two projects are:

- Enhance 45 acres of remnant oak forest and prairie that have been degraded by exotic invasive species and fire suppression at Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park. Methods will include woody invasive species control. This project will improve habitat for forest dwelling species, both resident and migratory, and improve ecological connectivity to the Mississippi River Corridor.
- Enhance 20 acres of floodplain forest and riparian habitat along 1 mile of the Vermillion River in Vermillion River Linear Park of Hastings, Dakota County. Methods will include woody invasive species control on 15 acres and planting native species at 5 acres. The project will improve the habitat values and the site's role as a habitat corridor, allowing greater movement for wildlife.

Great River Greening (GRG) -- Restore and enhance 66 acres of important prairie, oak savanna, oak woodland, floodplain forest and Big Woods forest habitat for wildlife and the public in tributaries to the Mississippi River through two projects:

- Restore and enhance 37 acres of prairie, oak savannah, oak woodland and Big Woods habitat at
 Trillium Nature Preserve in St. Paul along the Trout Brook Greenway. The project will create an
 ecologically-important wildlife corridor that will connect with the Mississippi River. The total project
 will consist of 1) the day-lighting of Trout Brook and associated riparian restoration (completed with
 other funds) and 2) major restoration of 32 acres prairie, oak savanna and oak woodland, coupled with
 enhancement of 5 acres Big Woods habitat (with OHF grant).
- Enhance 29 acres of oak woodland, floodplain forest and grassland habitat at Martin's Meadows Open Space on the Rum River in the City of Andover. Activities will include prescribed fire, forest thinning, invasive species control and other. The site includes shrub-carr wetlands, riparian floodplain forests, oak woodland and remnant prairie and oak savanna habitats. It is part of a significant contiguous wildlife habitat complex of over 1,000 acres that includes the 550-acre Cedar Creek Conservation Area (acquired with OHF) and 434-acre Rum River Central Regional Park, both managed by Anoka County Parks.

Minnesota Land Trust (MLT) -- Protect through perpetual conservation easements at least 150 acres of habitat along the Minnesota, Mississippi and St. Croix Rivers and key tributaries. The project will protect riparian habitat, as well as critical corridors of forest, wetland and grassland to connect existing, important areas of wildlife habitat. Activities include:

- Contact and negotiate with interested landowners
- Draft and complete 3-5 perpetual conservation easements protecting at least 150 acres
- Document property conditions
- Dedicate funds for the perpetual monitoring and enforcement of those easements

MLT easements are perpetual and prohibit land uses or development that will negatively affect important habitat and other conservation values. Easements are monitored annually and enforced as necessary by MLT's conservation easement stewardship program.

Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge Trust, Inc. (MVT) – Protect in fee title at least 250 acres of river frontage, floodplain forest, wetland and upland habitat for wildlife in the Minnesota River Valley. The OHF grant funds will expand the Blakely, Jessenland, Rapids Lake and/or St. Lawrence Units of the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge in Carver, LeSueur, Scott and/or Sibley Counties. An additional 62 acres will be acquired with other non-state funds.

All prioritized lands are along or very near the Minnesota River and include river frontage, floodplain and cropland. Following acquisition, the MVT and USFWS will develop a restoration and management plan, then restore and enhance the floodplain forest, wetlands and prairie.

This project will increase breeding and migratory habitat for waterfowl, shorebirds, neo-tropical migrants, and non-migratory resident species, protect the diversity of native ecosystems, and improve connectivity and resilience. This project also will improve water quality by restoring croplands in the Minnesota River Valley to the natural habitats of floodplain forest, wetlands and prairie. Finally, it will expand the public's access to lands for hunting and fishing, as well as other wildlife-based recreation.

Trust for Public Land (TPL) -- Protect in fee title 50 acres in one of six high-priority areas identified in statewide and regional plans, as well as by TPL public partners as immediate opportunities. An additional 10 acres will be acquired with other funds. The project(s) to be completed will be selected from the following:

Minnesota River Habitat Corridor:

- Protect up to 98 acres at Savage Fen Scientific and Natural Area adjacent to existing protected land and including wetland and associated upland forest
- Protect up to 300 acres at "Blakely Bluffs," connecting existing publicly-protected land (WMA and MN Valley Refuge lands) and including high biodiversity forests and bluff lands that adjoin the Minnesota River floodplain

Mississippi River Habitat Corridor:

 Protect up to 170 acres of aquatic, forest and wetland habitat on the Wild and Scenic Rum River just upstream of the Mississippi River

St. Croix River Habitat Corridor:

- Protect up to 200 acres of high biodiversity significance forest habitat at Franconia/ Scandia, complementing existing protected lands along the St. Croix National Scenic Riverway
- Protect up to 1,000 acres of forest and associated wetland / prairie/ grassland at Big Marine Lake which connects, via the St. Croix Greenway, to the St. Croix River
- Protect up to 800 acres of forest and associated shallow lakes, wetland / prairie/ grassland at Wilder Forest Lake which connects, via the St. Croix Greenway, to the St. Croix River.

Relationship to Other Constitutional Funds

Environmental and Natural Resource Trust Fund

All Metro Big Rivers partners also are partners in the Metropolitan Conservation Corridors (MeCC), which has received grants from the Minnesota Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund, as recommended by the Legislative-Citizen Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCCMR) since 2005. The OHF grants accelerate the partners' work protecting, restoring and enhancing critical habitat in the Twin Cities metropolitan urbanizing area and do not supplant any existing funding sources, including ENRTF. We will continue pursuing support from both funds to accelerate this work.

Accelerates or Supplements Current Efforts

All Metro Big Rivers projects build upon existing public investments and accelerate efforts to protect, restore and enhance high-priority habitat for wildlife and the public in the Metropolitan Urbanizing Area. The OHF grant funds will not substitute for or supplant any other funding sources. The work would not be able to proceed without the OHF grant or will have to wait sometime into the future when other funding may become available.

Sustainability and Maintenance

Friends of Mississippi RIver (FMR) -- Washington County Parks and the City of Hastings will sustain their respective lands enhanced under this grant. FMR is committed to being an active partner to ensure the benefits of this project are maintained. Great River Greening (GRG) – The Cities of St. Paul and Andover will monitor the sites and sustain the habitat improvements. GRG is committed to working cooperatively with the cities to ensure the project benefits are sustained. Minnesota Land Trust (MLT) – Easement stewardship is included in the budget and will follow best practices. MLT's stewardship program includes annual property monitoring, records management, addressing inquiries, interpretations, tracking changes in ownership, investigating potential violations and defending the easement.

Minnesota Valley Trust (MVT) – Lands acquired for the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge will be maintained by the US Fish and Wildlife Service. Initial restoration and enhancement will be completed by MVT prior to transfer to the USFWS. Trust for Public Land (TPL) – Working with experienced local, state and federal land programs, citizen groups and private landowners, TPL will ensure the acquired lands are restored, enhanced and maintained for wildlife habitat and public use.

Will local government approval be sought prior to acquisition? - No

MVT - Local governments within the expansion boundaries of the MN Valley National Wildlife Refuge have been made aware of the land acquisition plans for the Refuge. TPL - Local governments will be notified and asked for formal approval, when necessary.

Is the land you plan to acquire free of any other permanent protection? - Yes

Is this land open for hunting and fishing? - Yes

Lands acquired by the Minnesota valley Trust for the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge will be open for public hunting and fishing according to the National Wildlife Refuge Improvement Act. We cannot predetermine any regulations that may be placed on the lands, as the Refuge lands will be opened through a public process. But we anticipate hunting and fishing opportunities and regulations will be like those already established for lands previously acquired for the Refuge in these expansion units (Blakely, Jessenland, Rapids Lake, St. Lawrence Units). ://www.fws.gov/midwest/MinnesotaValley/documents/hunting regs. Lands acquired by the Trust for Public Land for the state or a local unit of government will be open to hunting and fishing. Any needed limitations will be established according to state law and regulations.

The St. Croix River Association (SCRA) is a strong supporter of the Metro Big Rivers Partnership Program Phase IV proposal recently submitted to the LSOHC for FY2014 funding consideration. The Metro Big Rivers Partnership Program is an excellent opportunity for SCRA to accomplish its own goals of increased and enhanced wildlife habitat adjacent to the Riverway and its associated watersheds..

The Metro Big Rivers Partnership Program offers SCRA the opportunity to refer interested landowners, local units of government and citizens to conservation organizations with a long track record of fee protection, easement protection, habitat restoration or enhancement throughout the state. As you know, the St. Croix National Scenic Riverway only protects a very narrow ribbon of land on either side of the St. Croix River itself. In order to protect the River, and its associated watershed lands, we must be able to protect high quality habitat along and near the Riverway. We view the Metro Big Rivers Partnership Program as a means towards this end.

The possibility of adding additional high quality habitat adjacent to the Riverway and the already-protected Franconia State Scientific and Natural Area -- all of which will be open for the public to hunt and fish -- is a great illustration. We are thrilled that The Trust for Public Land has been able to work closely with the MNDNR, Chisago County, townships, interested hunting and fishing leaders, other stakeholders and several landowners to protect high quality forest habitat adjacent to the Riverway and Franconia State Scientific and Natural Area and we encourage more protection in the near term. The area contains a rich diversity of native plant communities, from cliffs and seepage swamps, to prairies and pine forests. This stretch of the river corridor supports numerous rare species in Minnesota, such as the Coopers Hawk and cerulean warbler. The area is increasingly vulnerable to over-development, habitat fragmentation, erosion, and invasive species because it is so close to the developing edge of the Twin Cities.
