Abstract:

Purchase 15 acres and 3,500 feet of St. Croix shoreland paralleling Brown's Creek State Trail to provide recreational opportunities serving trail and river users and tourists from a wide area and to improve ecological functions through subsequent restoration.

Design and Scope of Work:

Washington County is partnering with the City of Stillwater to acquire 15 acres with 3,500 feet of frontage on the St. Croix River to preserve the ecological integrity of and increase the public access to the St. Croix River. This property is located just north of downtown Stillwater and parallels the Brown's Creek State Trail. The property is within the Lower St. Croix National Scenic Riverway District and is one of the longest stretches of St. Croix River frontage remaining in single ownership in Washington County.

The county will receive the grant funds and carry out the acquisition work. The city has agreed to accept the ownership and the future operations and management responsibilities and costs. The city will manage the land as a nature park serving trail users on the new Brown's Creek State Trail, river users, tourists and area residents. Currently, this property contains altered Silver Maple floodplain, and seepage swamp; some invasive species; turf and a modest home. The city will restore much of the property to a natural condition using native species and offer passive recreational uses such as shore fishing, transient dockage, walk-in boat launching, walking paths, nature observation, picnicking and trail access. The county and city will work with key stakeholders including the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the National Park Service (NPS) to prepare a master plan for the recreational use and restoration of the property. Because the county is contributing a large amount of the funds for this acquisition, the county will retain an interest in the property in the form of a conservation easement

before conveying the property to the city. The conservation easement will assure permanent protection by prohibiting land uses that negatively affect the river and its shoreland habitat.

The requested funds will provide a match to local funds. Both local and state funding is needed and is appropriate for this acquisition because of its high cost as St. Croix River property; its importance in protecting the scenic and ecological values of the St. Croix River, a state-designated resource; its use as a state trail amenity that will enhance the trail users' experience; and its ability to serve the recreational needs of a national, state and local clientele.

This acquisition is consistent with the following goals of the Statewide Conservation and Preservation Plan:

- Protect Critical Shorelands, particicularly the land habitats along the St. Croix River, and Keep Water on the Land: The St. Croix River is one of the most pristine large river ecosystems in the Upper Midwest; none-the-less it is impacted by nutrient and sediment pollution. In 2008, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency designated Lake St. Croix, the lower 25 miles of the St. Croix River, as an impaired water due to high levels of phosphorus. If left unprotected, this property could be developed into higher density residential development with additional nutrient and sediment loading to the river. Instead, public acquisition and the planned subsequent removal of the home and restoration of the property to a more natural condition would have positive impacts on the river environment and the water quality in Lake St. Croix including improved ecological diversity and ecosystem connectivity; increased breeding and migratory habitat for waterfowl, shorebirds, and neotropical migrants; and better filtering and storage of storm and flood waters.
- Improve Connectivity: Restoration of this property will expand an existing corridor of natural lands along the St. Croix River and Brown's Creek that are owned in fee by the DNR and the NPS or are permanently protected via easements held by the NPS.
- Improve Access to Outdoor Recreation: The property's location adjacent to the Brown's Creek State Trail, its proximity to downtown Stillwater, and the length of shoreland frontage along the St. Croix River make this a unique acquisition and a highly desirable destination for recreational pursuits on a nationally and state recognized significant natural resource. In particular, the property's low elevation makes it suitable for shore fishing, a recreational activity that is limited along the lower St. Croix River due to the prevalence of high banks and shoreland bluffs.

The landowner is elderly and is seeking to sell her property. For a limited time she is willing to negotiate for public ownership of all or a portion of the property before she markets it for private development. The county will negotiate for a purchase agreement that is contingent on receiving matching funds. The county will be ready to close on the purchase shortly after receiving the matching funds. The landowner seems willing to wait to close until after July 2014. An appraisal is underway; the project cost will be updated when the appraisal is completed. The county may reduce the amount of funds requested if a lower purchase price can be negotiated; the requested funds will not include the value of the home.

Although this new park will provide additional public access and recreational opportunities to the St. Croix River and a much needed rest area at the terminus of the Brown's Creek State Trail neither the NPS nor the DNR is interested in owning the property. The NPS cannot own the property because it is outside the National Scenic Riverway District boundary and is located within the state-managed portion of the riverway district. The DNR owns enough land to build the state trail. Both agencies are supportive of this acquisition and will be actively involved in preparing the master plan. The project is also supported by the St. Croix River Association and enjoys broad public support in the local community.

The St. Croix River is a national treasure and vital community asset that deserves protection because of its clean water, high quality natural ecosystems, beautiful scenery, unique cultural resources, abundant recreation opportunities and striking geologic features.

Washington County has applied for ENRTF funds for this project. The county will reduce this request if ENRTF funds are awarded.

Accelerates or Supplements Current Efforts:

Washington County began its land protection efforts in 2000 with a grant from the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources and a small amount of county levy dollars. In 2006 voters approved a referendum authorizing the county to issue \$20 million in bonds to acquire lands to improve water quality of rivers, lakes and streams; protect drinking water sources; preserve wetlands and woodlands; purchase parkland; and protect land along water bodies from development. This referendum provides long-term stable funding for the county's conservation work through the Washington County Land and Water Legacy Program. The county has adopted a Conservation Priorities Plan and site evaluation criteria that aid the county in being strategic in choosing projects that best meet the referendum purposes and maximize the ecological benefits of public funds. The county's priorities are to acquire interests that increase recreational opportunities; that are adjacent to waterways or recreational facilities; that serve multiple public purposes; and that provide public access. A citizen advisory committee rated this acquisition as very high for meeting program goals and priorities and recommends its purchase. The requested funds will be used to match the local sources of funds available for this purchase.

Sustainability and Maintenance:

After the purchase and before conveying the property to the city Washington County will record a conservation easement in the county's favor over the property. This easement will assure permanent protection by prohibiting land uses that negatively affect the river and its shoreland habitat. Washington County will monitor the property on an annual basis and will take necessary enforcement action to ensure that the development and use of the property is consistent with the terms of the conservation easement and the management and restoration plans. Subsequent to its purchase, the county and city will work with partners to restore the property to a more natural condition using native species in accordance with the restoration plan. Additional grants will be sought from appropriate sources to fund the restoration activities in a timely manner.

Outcomes

- Improved aquatic habitat indicators Restoration will establish native vegetation with deep roots that will act as a buffer to infiltrate water run-off, store flood waters and absorb pollutants.
- Increased natural-resource based recreational opportunities. Will provide additional opportunities to access the St. Croix River for boating and fishing measured in user days.

Application to Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council for Grant Funds to Acquire Property along the St. Croix River in the City of Stillwater through the Washington County Land and Water Legacy Program

WHEREAS, Washington County established the Washington County Land and Water Legacy Program (LWLP) after voters approved a twenty million dollar referendum to acquire interests in property for the preservation of water quality, woodlands and other natural areas; and

WHEREAS, the owner of 15 acres including 3,500 feet of shoreland along the St. Croix River identified as PIN # 2103020410026 is willing to negotiate for public ownership of all or a portion of this parcel; and

WHEREAS, purchasing this property would meet the LWLP purpose to protect land along water bodies from development, and improve the ecological integrity of and increase the public access to the St. Croix River, a federally- and state-designated scenic riverway; and

WHEREAS, on December 6, 2012, the Washington County Board of Commissioners agreed that this property merits protection and stated that it is willing to consider providing LWLP bond funds to acquire the property; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners desires to leverage county dollars through outside sources of funds; and

WHEREAS, on January 8, 2013, the City of Stillwater agreed to consider owning and managing the property as a city park; and

WHEREAS, the Lessard Sams Outdoor Heritage Council (L-SOHC) is requesting proposals for projects to receive funding from the Outdoor Heritage Fund beginning July 1, 2014; and

WHEREAS, purchase of this property is consistent with the Statewide Priority Criteria of the L-SOHC Fiscal Year 2015 Call for Funding Request;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves submitting a grant request to the L-SOHC for up to two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) to match local funds to purchase the property with PIN # 2103020410026.

On behalf of the St. Croix River Association (SCRA), I am writing in support of the purchase 3500 feet of St. Croix shoreland that borders the Brown's Creek State Trail to be used as a city park that will provide passive recreation serving trail, river users, and tourists. The project proposes to restore much of the property to a natural condition and operate it as a nature park with passive recreational uses such as shore fishing, transient dockage, walk-in boat launching, walking paths, nature observation, picnicking, and trail access.

The land currently contains altered Silver Maple floodplain, and seepage swamp; some invasive species; turf and a modest home. The restoration of the turf and invasive species to a more natural condition using native species will improve ecological diversity and ecosystem connectivity; increase breeding and migratory habitat for waterfowl, shorebirds, and neo-tropical migrants. The more natural landscape and shoreline will have water quality benefits. The native vegetation with deep roots will act as a buffer to infiltrate water run-off, store flood waters and absorb pollutants. As the recreated habitat matures it will require minimal maintenance and complement the existing natural landscape.

SCRA was formed in 1911, and our mission is to protect, restore and celebrate the St. Croix River and its watershed. The SCRA is the only existing organization with a watershed-wide scope able to focus on both sides of the river and both the upper and lower portions of the basin. The location next to the St. Croix and the new Brown's Creek Trail make this an important acquisition, we are very pleased to support this project.
