Protecting Working Forests: Minnesota's Forest Legacy and Forests for the Future Programs Landowner Application and Instructions





This application is intended to allow landowners to apply for project funding made available to the Forest Legacy Program and the Minnesota Forests for the Future Program in order to protect environmentally important private forests, primarily through the purchase of conservation easements. Forest land eligible for the programs shall provide <u>one or more</u> of the following public benefits:

- 1. The property contributes to the protection of large forest blocks;
- 2. the property provides fish and wildlife habitat, promotes water quality or has other environmental benefits; 3. the property provides opportunities for the continuation of traditional forest uses including forest management; 4. the property contains public recreation opportunities such as public access or pubic recreation trails.

Purpose of the Forest Legacy Program and the Forests for the Future Program

The overall purpose of the Forest Legacy and the Forests for the Future Programs is to protect private working forests that provide important public benefits including environmental, economic and recreational benefits.

- The Forest Legacy Program (FLP) is a partnership between the State and the USDA
 Forest Service to identify and protect environmentally important forests from
 conversion to non-forest uses. Projects are funded using federal funds and local cost sharing. Eligible projects must be located within designated Forest Legacy Areas within
 the State (see Minnesota Forest Legacy Areas Map).
- The Minnesota Forests for the Future Program (MFF) was established by the Minnesota Legislature to protect and conserve private working forests throughout Minnesota that contain timber, scenic, recreational, fish and wildlife habitat, threatened and endangered species, and other cultural and environmental values. Projects are funded using state, federal and private funds.

The easement may be sold or transferred, but the conservation easement ill permanently encumber the land. The following rights are typically restricted with a working forest inservation easement. Checking AGREE (agrees with the restriction or term)or DISAGREE (does not ree with the restriction or term) does not commit you to anything, it merely assists Minnesota DNR in aluating your property for the program.				

The following restrictions are included in Forest Legacy and Minnesota Forests for the Future Conservation easements. Subdivision of properties will generally be prohibited and only allowed in very limited circumstances. The landowner retains the right to use the property for traditional forest uses such as forest management (including timber harvesting) as well as for noncommercial recreational purposes. The easement requires the landowner to manage the property in a manner that is consistent with the purposes of the program and that the landowner shall not convert the property to non-forest uses. In some situations a limited amount of compatible non-forest areas such as pasture, grassland, agricultural fields or other open lands may be included in the easement area.
